Life Tribute: Michael H. Bryant

Michael Hubert Bryant was born on May 13, 1951, to Mother, Betty Wood Bryant (Mammy) and Father, Hubert Bryant (Pappy) in San Diego, California. He was the older brother of Lynne Bryant and Peggy Bryant, and the younger brother of Robert Russell, Gayle Ashby and Janice Sabatini. He grew up in the Linda Vista neighborhood, attended local schools, graduating from Kearny High School in 1969. He was proud to be a native San Diegan.

Mike's industrious work career started at the local W.T. Grant store as a stock boy, he also worked at a bakery in Pacific Beach and Robinsons department store restaurant in the new Fashion Valley Shopping Center, before he got a nighttime maintenance job at the San Diego County Office of Education. He continued to work at SDCOE throughout college, and stayed 43 years, retiring in 2014 as a custodial supervisor, making many life friends there.

Mike graduated from Mesa College and San Diego State University with a degree in Graphic Arts and a High School Teaching Credential. He began teaching Vocational Education during the day for the Regional Occupational Program through Grossmont Union High School District. He taught a popular commercial cleaning class and introduced many people to skills that led to their own businesses. Mike also taught Special Education students at the Work Training Center. His final teaching years were in the Correctional Education program, where he taught at the East Mesa Detention Facility and the San Diego Central Jail. He was well-liked by the Sheriff's deputies as well as the inmates. He was honored with two Golden Apple Awards for outstanding teaching. In addition to these jobs, he had his own carpet cleaning business.

Mike married Louise Horton in 1972 and had two children, Steven and Michelle. They kept a Volkswagen van packed and ready to go on weekend camping trips and took annual treks to see in-laws in Roseburg, Oregon. He visited the USSR with Louise and Lynne on a tour he found in the newspaper for \$795, each; and he interviewed for teaching jobs at many vacation destinations. He was offered one in Alaska but decided to stay in Sunny San Diego.

Life led them in different directions, and Mike next continued to travel as a single dad. Mike, Steve and Michelle completed seeing every state in 1990 as well as spots in Canada before crossing the pond to Europe in 1993. Mike enjoyed lobster fishing, scuba diving, and metal detecting, the modern equivalent of treasure hunting. His father, Pappy, enjoyed joining him with the kids on the road to weekend competition hunts and campouts. He was proud of his son and daughter and celebrated every success and life event from marriage to births to career advancements. He loved his family.

Mike met Dixie Rookwood at SDCOE and married in 1994. During their 30-year marriage they enjoyed a travel odyssey to over 60 countries, and a happy partnership. They frequently traveled with family and made friends all over the world. Mike and Dixie were also involved and served in a variety of clubs and organizations reflecting Mike's interests. Their home became the hub of family holiday gatherings, as well as hosting club Christmas and summer parties.

Always curious and creative, Mike has won multiple national awards for his articles and as newsletter editor for the San Diego Antique Bottle and Collectibles Club. He also wrote *The Haunted Whaley House* - their bestselling gift shop book. His collection of rare antique bottles filled a special room addition to his home he called "a museum." It was considered the best-known collection of San Diego bottles. He was interviewed on radio (*Galaxy Moonbeam Night Site*) and television (NBC Channel 2 - Larry Himmel; KPBS *About San Diego* - Ken Krammer) and was consulted by *California Gold* - Huell Howser for his local history knowledge and interesting artifacts. He was also a sought-after speaker on a variety of topics such as Hobo Nickles, stories of lost treasure in San Diego County, and of course antique San Diego bottles.

Mike's most precious treasure came when he was blessed with two grandsons: first Raymond, and then Kenny. He loved creating adventures for them, such as taking them on Disney cruises, to the Del Mar Fair, or to the neighborhood park. He took joy picking them up from school, watching them learn to ride bikes, or the electric tractor he found at a yard sale.

He was a pragmatic man, felt he had a lot to live for, and much he wanted to do. He lived three years after he was diagnosed with late-stage cancer, and said every day was worth it, and the treatment was not that bad. He assured us he was at peace, and it was "just the facts of life." He asked that his carefully curated bottles be passed on to be enjoyed by others...that he was just a custodian of them for the time he had them. Now, he would ask us to be at peace, to enjoy the memories of the time we had with him and continue to look forward to life while having hope for that reunion with him, and all our other loved ones waiting in heaven.

Monthly Find Competition Rules Entering Your Find

General info: We currently have 8 categories. Your find should fit into one of them! Every find must have been made with a metal detector since the last meeting. A picture of the item will be accepted if the item is not available to be there. You may enter only one item in each category. items that are found together count as one item. (A cross on a chain, matching bracelets, are examples.) The competition table judges will help you place your find if needed. Their decisions are final! . Categories:

Most Unusual. Our catchall category! If your item fits better elsewhere it should be placed there. Tell us what you know about your find. Age, type of metal, what makes it unusual! Examples: a brass boat rudder, a meteorite, a toy, who knows!

Relic. Must be at least 50 years old! Describe the item.

Best Foreign Coin . What is it? Is it dated? Does it have value? Type of metal? An undated gold Roman coin can go here!

Best Token. What is it? Is it dated? Does it have value? Type of metal?

Oldest Dated Coin. The date must be visible with a loop. We have to be able to read the date!

Best North American Coin. Canada, USA, and Mexican coins. An identifiable “slick” large cent might win this category.

Best Other Jewelry. Non-precious metal items that were made as personal adornment items or for display purposes.

Silver. Items stamped .800 and above or sterling. You can also have an item tested and certified. Silver plated items belong in Other Jewelry.

Gold, Platinum and Palladium. Items stamped with a claim as to the metal content, or tested and certified. Counterfeit items will be removed by the judges. Gold plated non-precious metal items belong in the Other Jewelry category.

Best overall. What was your favorite item from all of the other categories? It may be the most valuable find, or it may not! Examples: The gold ring with diamonds, the Civil War sword

VOTING. Vote for one item in each category by circling the letter on the voting slip that corresponds with that item's envelope. **Vote once for your personal choice as to the best overall find from among the 8 preceding categories.**
